



ask for it. It doesn't mean putting up with nonsense just because they dish it out.

Loving involves caring for the long term well-being of your child, even if it requires some short term pain. As such, real love will spank your behind, lay you out, take away your privileges, and steer you right before you go wrong.

When love disciplines it does not always do it in a negative way. Often, it does so by providing rules, order and structure in a child's life. Through these, children will not be allowed to roam freely and will be held accountable for their actions.

When you discipline, make sure your child knows that you do love them. Your love should be expressive more often and more powerfully than your discipline or else your child may think you are correcting them just for your kicks. Make sure you are doing it out of love not vengeance, anger, rage, wrath, or jealousy. Then, learn to discipline your own discipline so that you don't go too far. Whenever love does the discipline, it usually checks itself before it becomes abuse.


All children do not require the same kind of discipline, but at some point, all children do require discipline. If you love them, do them and yourself a favor, discipline them with love.

hicago is one of America's greatest cities. Yet many of its residents live in terror in what is virtually a war zone. When a demented killer slayed 49 in a gun rampage in Orlando, Fla., there was national attention. Presidential candidates called for escalating the fight against the Islamic State in the Middle East, even though the killer seems to be a homegrown terrorist.

But in Chicago, 404 have died in gun violence this year. According to the Congressional Research Service, the murder rate averaged 16.0 per 100,000 a year from 2010-2014. That is nearly four times the national average of 4.6 per 100,000 and nearly three times the Illinois state average (5.8).

These killings are not randomly distributed. African Americans constitute about one-third of Chicago's residents, but they account for 80 percent of its murder victims.

The killings are concentrated in endangered communities, communities burdened with abject poverty and deplorable conditions. Desperation and murder are segregated in Chicago.

In West Garfield Park, the average per capita income is \$10,951. More than 40 percent of the residents live below the poverty line, with an unemployment rate greater than 25 percent.

In Englewood, the average per capita household income is \$11,993. Forty-two percent of households live below the poverty

line, with an unemployment rate over 21 percent.

In Fuller Park, per capita household income is \$9,016, with a majority — 55.5 percent — of households living below the poverty line. The unemployment rate is 40 percent. Washington Park, North Lawndale, Austin, Greater Grand Crossing, East Garfield Park ... the list goes on.

During the height of the Great Depression, the unemployment rate hovered at roughly 20 percent. These neighborhoods are suffering levels twice that, now six years into the supposed recovery.

These are disaster zones in a supposedly world-class city. They look like they are under siege, and to some extent they are. Drugs and guns, violence and despair mark lives condemned to live in these zones.

The war in Iraq — one the Bush administration chose to launch — will end up costing us more than \$3 trillion. And of course, the wars go on — in Afghanistan, in Syria, in Iraq, in Yemen, and now the U.S. is beginning to bomb Libya.

But the right now disaster zones in Chicago are ignored. The everyday violence is decried but nothing is done. The poverty is regretted but there is no plan to attack it.


In fact, national policy does more to expand the divide between endangered communities and affluent ones, between those living in the disaster zone and those living uptown.

A new report by the Institute for Policy Studies and the Center for Enterprise Development details the growing racial wealth gap in America. They find that without a drastic change in policy, by 2043, when people of color are projected to account for more than half of the U.S. population, the racial wealth divide between white households and African American and Latino households will have doubled from about \$500,000 in 2013 to more than \$1 million.

The gap reflects the impact of historic inequities — from federally sanctioned housing discrimination to private redlining — but its expansion is fueled in part by tax policies that aid the highest earners while providing the lowest income families with virtually nothing.

Over the past 20 years alone, the report finds, the federal government spent more than \$8 trillion through tax programs to assist families in building long-term wealth, including saving for retirement, purchasing a home, starting a business or paying for college. But the impact of these expenditures has been "upside down." With typical millionaires pocketing about \$145,000 in public tax benefits each year to increase their wealth while working families receive a total of \$174 on average.

More of the same won't help. Adding benefits to the wealthy few — like Donald Trump's call to end the estate tax — will add to the inequity and contribute to the despair. If nothing changes, the desperate zones will get worse. Surely this crisis is worthy of debate in the presidential campaign, and action from the White House and Congress.

There is a huge qualitative difference between media that is Black owned as compared to non-Black owned media that is targeted to Black consumers. Numerous national studies have documented that Black owned newspapers remain the "trusted and respected" source of news, empowering success stories, and cultural aspirations for more than 45 million Black Americans.

The inaugural Discover the Unexpected (DTU) NNPA Journalism Fellowship Program this summer at the Howard University School of Communications supported by Chevrolet has done remarkably well in

identifying and encouraging the next generation of gifted, talented and committed young journalism scholars. The National Newspaper Publishers Association is pleased with the positive and transformative results of the DTU fellowships.

The NNPA fellows scored front page news features in selected NNPA member newspapers across the nation. In addition to attending both the Republican National Convention in Cleveland and the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia, the NNPA fellows completed assignments that covered a wide range of news interests including news on Muhammad Ali's legacy, Black arts and culture, contemporary urban Black family life, 2016 Olympics in Rio, mass incarceration, new data on police and prosecutorial misconduct and abuse on African Americans and others, the quest to cure Sickle

Cell Anemia, and the struggle to preserve Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

During the past months, Brandi Montgomery and Brelaun Douglas were at The Atlanta Voice; Briahnna Brown and Mckenzie Marshall at the Chicago Defender; Victoria Jones and Rushawn Walters at The Washington Informer; and, Tatyana Hopkins and Sidnee King were at the Michigan Chronicle.

Black owned newspapers are businesses and employers that continue to serve the economic development interests of Black communities. As the economy in the United States continues to rebound from economic stagnation and recession under the leadership of the first African American President, it should also be a national priority to ensure the advancement of the economic wellbeing of Black families, businesses,

and communities.

President Barack H. Obama, in the face of historic political opposition in Washington, DC since his first day in office, has achieved leadership success in restoring and revitalizing the U.S. economy. In particular the automotive industry has set new records this year in automobile sells. Thus, we note with appreciation those companies in the automotive sector that have been supportive of the NNPA during these difficult and challenging times.

BLACK ATHLETES

Simone Manuel: Team USA, Swimming

At 20 years old, Simone Manuel made history when she became the first black woman to earn a gold medal in individual swimming. She is from Houston Texas and attends Stanford University. Manuel burst into tears following her win on August 11, which is significant, especially considering swimming's racist past. "

This medal is not just for me, it's for all the people who believe they can't do it."



Simone Biles: Team USA, Gymnastics

Simone Biles is a formidable force on Team USA's majority-minority Olympic gymnastics group this year. At 19 years old, Biles has distinguished herself as the world's most dominant gymnast. She is the only woman to win world championships for three consecutive years and has been undefeated in all the gymnastic meets she's competed in since 2013. The world recognizes her success and praises her powerful performances. She is truly an incomparable athlete.

"I'm not the next Usain Bolt or Michael Phelps. I'm the first Simone Biles."



Gabby Douglas: Team USA, Gymnastics

Gabby Douglas won gold in the 2012 London Olympics and became the first African-American to win the individual all-around title. She continues her legacy at this year's Olympics where she helped Team USA win gold in gymnastics. Douglass played a critical role in the team's success this year. Douglas has endured unfair public scrutiny of her actions and appearance yet continues to triumph.

"I have these challenges and circumstances and for me I love it. It determines if I'm going to give in, give up or push that limit and achieve my goal."



Daryl Homer made a historic win for Team USA when he was awarded the silver medal in men's sabre fencing, becoming the first American and first African-American to take home the award in 112 years. Homer competed in the 2012 London Olympics. Homer said Peter Westbrook, a black Olympic fencer who scored the bronze medal in the controversial 1984 Los Angeles Olympics, motivated him to achieve success in the sport.

"I wouldn't have found an access point to fencing without Peter, so I probably wouldn't have been here."

DOMINATE 2016 OLYMPICS

Carmelo Anthony: Team USA, Men's Basketball

Carmelo Anthony broke a big record on Aug. 11 when he became America's all-time leading scorer in basketball in the Olympics. Representing Team USA, Anthony scored 293 points in total and claimed victory in the Olympic game against Australia. His performance surpassed a record once held by LeBron James, whose Olympic tally stands at 262 points. This is Anthony's fourth Olympics and he already has three Olympic gold medals.

"I can look back on it when my career is over... if I don't have an NBA championship ring...and say I had a great career"



Rafaela Silva: Team Brazil, Judo

On August 8, Rafaela Silva won the gold medal in the 57-kilogram division for women's judo. With tears in her eyes, she claimed Brazil's first gold medal at the Rio Olympics. As a black woman born in one of Brazil's impoverished favelas, Silva constantly combatted heavy racism from residents who still uphold a strong anti-black sentiment.

"She has faced countless obstacles, injustices, and oppression in her young life, but the judo athlete showed incredible courage to overcome everything on her way to a win gold in her hometown's Olympic Games.'



Almaz Ayana: Team Ethiopia, Track and Field

August 12, Ethiopian runner Almaz Ayana broke two records when she set new highs for both the Olympic and world records in the 10,000-meter race in Rio. Ayana, who represents Ethiopia in the Rio Olympics, finished the race in superb timing, which left many around the world astounded by her athleticism. Even sports commentators who watched her performance in real-time were in awe.

"What we have witnessed is one the finest athletic achievements we've ever seen."



Ibtihaj Muhammad: Team USA, Fencing

Ibtihaj Muhammad shattered stereotypes when she represented Team USA in this year's Olympics and became the first American athlete to compete while wearing a hijab, which is the headscarf worn by Muslim women. Muhammad did not win gold in the women's individual sabre fencing competition but millions of people around the world admire the work she has done to dispel myths around Muslim women.





wing back takes to the IRS and getting those threatening letters can be very frightening. For what it's worth, take some comfort in knowing that you are not alone. The good news is that you have many options. To fully understand and take advantage of your options, I urge you to see a qualified tax resolution professional. 
In the original Greek text, the 12 verses of Ephesians 1:3–14 were a single sentence. This is one of the most joyful and profound passages in the Bible. Like an anthem of praise, it celebrates God's eternal and glorious plan of redemption. It is broken up into three stanzas, each beginning or ending with the phrase "to the praise of his glorious grace"

(Ephesians 1:6, NIV) or "for" or "to the praise of his glory" (1:12, 14, NIV).

This passage examines the plan of redemption from a triune perspective: the first stanza (1:3– 6) praises the Father for choosing to redeem us from our sin; the second stanza highlights Jesus as the Redeemer (1:7–12); and the third stanza (1:13–14) reveals the Holy Spirit as the living, divine presence to the church and the world. In these 12 short verses, the vast plan of redemption is revealed from eternity before creation, to the time of its future completeness at the time of Christ's Second Advent. The focus of redemption is always Christ, and the phrase "in Christ" or "in him" occurs repeatedly throughout this passage. In fact, this phrase is the key phrase of this entire epistle. According to verse 5, it is God's great pleasure and will, by virtue of Christ's redemption, to adopt us into the family of God.

In our impersonal and hurried world, people are longing for connection—a place to belong. Some search for relationships at work, at the gym, or even online. Others hope for a sense of belonging within their own family. Still others move from relationship to relationship, never really feeling loved or accepted anywhere.

As believers, we can offer others the blessing of meaningful relationships within the body of Christ. In fact, it is usually through relationships that we are able to lovingly invite others to join us in the family of God.






